








Venanzo da Camerino and Piergentile da Matelica

# THE STRANGE TALE OF ARCIMBOLDO

A long, long time ago in a big city called Milan there lived a strange man. His name was Giuseppe Arcimboldo and without a shadow of a doubt he was truly original, curious, full of fantasy and inventive!

He was a painter and he started painting when he was still very young, first with his father , who was also a painter, and later he started working in the Cathedral in Milan. His success began when the Emperor Massimiliano II, who was a very important monarch, employed him and took him to Vienna. This is where he started to portray people by painting an assemblage of fruit and vegetables. In short, this was a method no one had ever used before, it was highly comical, a way of joking with people. For example, he painted a "greengrocer" but if you turned the picture upside down it became "Vegetables in a Bowl".

He even painted very powerful people like the new Emperor Rudolph II.

Despite the fact that he used pears for their noses or pumpkins for their foreheads, nobody was ever offended, on the contrary. Arcimboldo was assigned a commission to paint the Four Seasons and in this case he used flowers for the Spring, fruit for the Summer, grapes for Autumn and bare branches and ivy for Winter!!!!







# DEAR BOYS AND GIRLS I WANT TO TELL YOU SOMETHING INTERESTING...... DO YOU KNOW HOW PEOPLE MADE COLOURS MANY YEARS AGO, WHEN THERE WERE NO FELT-TIPS OR CRAYONS???





ONE OF THE METHODS WAS TO USE A STRANGE MIXTURE, THIS WAS **KNOWN AS** "THE EGG TEMPERA TECHNIQUE", WHICH FORMED HIGHLY RESISTANT COLOURS...... YOU CAN TRY IT OUT FOR YOURSELVES.....NOW I'LL TELL YOU WHAT THE INGREDIENTS ARE.....



- AN EGG YOLK (without any white)
- A LITTLE VINEGAR (made from white wine)
- PIGMENTS of vegetable or animal origin
- WATER
